Freemasonry worldwide

Each Province and District is comprised of Lodges, and it is a Lodge that you join when you become a member. There are currently over 175,000 Freemasons, belonging to more than 6,300 Lodges in England and Wales and 720 overseas. Membership gives you access to all of them and the fun that comes with them.

The United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE) oversees Lodges spanning 48 Provinces (regions across England and Wales) and 32 active Districts located overseas.

UGLE is universally regarded as the Mother Grand Lodge of organised Freemasonry. In addition to our Provinces and Districts, we also recognise over 200 Grand Lodges around the world.

Freemasonry brings together an incredibly diverse range of individuals.

A Grand Lodge is the governing body of Freemasonry within a particular territory, where territory usually means a country or state.





Your family and Freemasonry

Freemasonry is all about building character and supporting members as individuals. We encourage all members to be open with their family about membership and what that teaches and brings to them personally, so please share the information available to you.

Lodges organise a range of social events to which family and friends are very welcome. These can include dinners, dances, community fundraising and less formal occasions such as barbecues and live music events. Many members' partners become friends and often help organise some of the events.





What are the qualifications for joining?

You must be male, at least 18 years old and have completed your secondary education; be of good character and hold a belief in a supreme being.

What will be expected of me?

Members can do as much as they wish. Participate as much as you can and ask questions. The administration, ceremonial, accounting, fundraising and general running of the Lodge is carried out voluntarily by its members.

What is the time commitment?

Each Lodge has a different schedule of meetings. Most meet between four and ten times a year. Lodges also hold social events, providing an occasion for members, their partners and families to come together.

How much will it cost?

There is a one-off joining fee and each Lodge will charge an annual subscription to cover its running costs. The membership team will discuss the options in your area with you.

Lodge meetings are normally followed by a dinner, with the cost depending on the venue. There is no requirement to attend the dinner if you are unable to, but you will likely find the socialising to be a highly enjoyable part of your experience as a Freemason.

Members are invited to donate to charity but this should always be within your means and it is entirely up to you how much you wish to contribute.

What is the dress code?

The usual dress code is a dark suit, white shirt, black shoes and black (or other suitable) tie. Some Lodges are more formal and members wear dinner suits. What I enjoy most is being part of something meaningful, which challenges me and provides friendship and support all at the same time.

Why do we wear regalia in Lodges?

Wearing regalia is historical and symbolic and has its roots in the use of aprons by ancient operative stone masons. Members wear different aprons depending on which level they have reached within Freemasonry. Just like a uniform, these serve to indicate to members where they rank in the organisation.

How to join?

There are two routes. You can be recommended by someone you know who is already a member or you can fill out the online enquiry form located on the UGLE website:

From there, your enquiry will be sent to the most appropriate Province or District for where you live and/or work, and we will then contact and introduce you to a suitable Lodge. The Lodge will give you the opportunity to ask any questions and to find out more.

I joined Freemasonry to spend more time with my father, to meet different people from outside of my own social circle and give something back to my community in the terms of charity. I joined at 37 – I should have joined when I was in my late 20s.


The First Degree Ceremony reminds you that all are equal – it is the responsibility of those that do well to look after those less fortunate.
